






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Location Map of Asansol Girls' College

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. Criterion I: Curricular aspects

Established immediately after independence, the Asansol Girls' College played and continues to play an important role in promoting women's empowerment in the region. The highlights under this criterion are as follows:

- The college offers undergraduate courses in three branches (both General and Honours) humanities, science and commerce according to BU Syllabus.
- With changing job market scenario, it has introduced career-oriented subjects like BCA, Microbiology, Computer Science (Hons) and Nutrition (Hons), diploma, certificate courses in Functional English, Travel &Tourism Management and Community Development.
- The college has an effective feedback mechanism special mention may be made of constructive parent-teacher meetings.

2. Criterion II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

The highlights under this criterion are as follows:

- Students are admitted on the basis of their academic performance in the last school leaving examination
- Access to SC/ST/OBC and Physically Challenged are created as per Government rules
- Free (number: 97) and half-free (number: 91) studentships are offered to meritorious and economically weaker sections.
- Mostly lecture method is used while science faculties practical rooms, overhead projectors, slides, models maps, computers for teaching-learning; however classroom seminar, group discussion are popular in all faculties.
- Tutorials are regularly held for the Honours students.
- Apart from Central library each department has a small but useful departmental library.
- Teachers are encouraged to join orientation courses, national & international seminars and granted study leave to work under F.I.P. scheme(U.G.C.)
- The institution practices both self-appraisal and evaluation by students for objective assessment of teaching quality
- Evaluation and performance monitoring of students' progress are made through periodically class tests; however the final evaluation is done by the University
- The report cards of internal exams are sent to parents and answer scripts shown to students

3. Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The institution being purely an UG College the scope for guiding research projects is very small. Still the highlights under this criterion are:

- One of the faculty members is involved in minor research projects separately.
- Research papers and books of about 32 faculty members have been published.
- With the help of the Alumni Association, College is going to begin, free of cost, personal and career councelling service.
- Extension activities through N.S.S. participation of faculty, as Judges in Lok-Adalat, as experts in selection committee and also to deliver speech in different institution.
- Some faculty members in linkage with the University of Burdwan is carrying on projects works and also have published abstracts in University journals.

4. Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The highlights under this criterion are as follows:

- Though building infrastructure of the college is well endowed, expansion activities are going on to upgrade new and existing facilities; during the last five years 17003 sq. feet floor space has been added and Rs.7812433/- spent for this purpose
- The maintenance of the physical infrastructure is looked after by finance and development committees

- The library has good number of books with computer, printer and reprographic facilities; connection for internet has been applied for but is yet to be installed
- During the last five years Rs.577677/- have been spent on purchase of new books and journals owing to change in syllabus and pattern. More New books will be purchased soon.
- College students can use the computer facilities in a limited way.
- College has two girls' hostels consisting of 124 students, has sent a plan for expansion to UGC.
- The college has part time medical health officer.
- College last year has successfully arranged placement of a few students in CTS, Wipro. In 2007 through Career India Consultant, Kolkata and TCS a few students have got chance.
- The college has a large playground, a badminton court and indoor games facilities. Regular annual sports competition are held. For the establishment of a gymnasium we will take up the matter under XIth Five Year Planning grant of the UGC.
- Space of the reading room has been felt to be inadequate and a new one is under construction

5. Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The highlights under this criterion are as follows:

- The current year student strength is 3335 (including Higher Secondary Section) out of which 53 are from other States.
- On a conservative estimate around 20% of the students go for higher studies
- A sizeable number pass through competitive examinations like NET/SLET, GATE/SSC exams
- Detailed information about the college is available in the prospectus
- The alumni association has a close bond with the institution; it helps to run a career counseling centre and also contributes to the development of its alma mater
- The Grievance Redressal Cell handles all types of complains
- The extra curricular activities of the students are highly praise worthy. The students performed well in inter-collegiate meets and cultural programmes. One became University Blue.

6. Criterion VI: Organization & Management

The highlights under this criterion are as follows:

- The college always tries to function with the leadership from the Head of the institution.
- All academic, administrative and financial subcommittees are framed in a democratic way.
- Some of the committees are statutory
- All important decisions in all spheres are resolved in the Governing Body.
- For every academic session and financial year perspective planning for all round institutional development is chalked out with participatory note of all involved.
- For manpower management, the institution obeys the regulatory authorities, viz. Government of West Bengal and the University of Burdwan. Judicious use of resources is encouraged.
- For financial management at the beginning of the year a budget proposal is made and allotment is made according to the need.
- The account is audited upto the year 2004-2005 by Govt. auditors. No major objection of audit in the accounts of the institution has been found. The audit for the year 2005-2006 will be completed within February, 2007.

1.1 Goal Orientation

The vision of the poet saw a reworking, though in a small scale, when in 1950 Asansol Girls' College was established with the mission of educating girls and empowering them to rightfully assert themselves in all spheres of human life. The mission of the college to promote enlightment and empowerment among women in this industrial area and meeting with the global challenges through renovation and modification of the methods in order to achieve the goals is the key to successful journey over the decades. It has been a source of intellectual strength to women learners and will remain so in the days to come.

2. Does the mission statement reflect the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future etc?

The college started its journey as an intermediate college to educate the minds of young girls. From a humble beginning in the premises of Monimala Girls' High School, it was gradually upgraded to the Degree standard with the introduction of B.A. pass course in the session 1957-58. This upgradation indicates how the college is successfully moving on its way to achieve its goal in the spread of higher education among women in this coalfield and industrial area. The Dayshift section was extended to the Morning section in 1969; Commerce stream was introduced in 1996. The students are proving themselves successful in this section securing ranks in the University examination in a consistant manner. During the post liberalization period the higher education structure of the country has seen some significant changes. The college has been quick to respond to the present day need and application—orientated subjects like Nutrition(Hons), Computer Science(Hons), Microbiology and BCA were introduced at the Degree level. The adoption of Career Oriented Courses(UGC sponsored) is another step forward in this direction. Our mission to help the girl students of this area to take their rightful places in the national as well as in international area is reflected in the institution's visions for the future.

The institution's value orientation is reflected in the student profile. Students from different cultural and socio-economic backgrounds enter into this portals of HEI. The institution is alert to make the student realize knowledge in its broader sense, the nature of human development and the process of human learning. The aspiration at this moment is to move

the student from the field of information to the field of knowledge. It is also a goal of the institution to make the student aware about the nation's diversity of geographical and cultural milieus while ensuring a common core of values along with academic components.

3. What are the goals and objectives of the college? How are they made known to the various stakeholders?

The goal of the college is to spread the light of knowledge among the girls and to attain the elusive triangle of Indian education, "Equality, Quality and Quantity". Its objective is to empower women towards the future so that they can find a rightful place in society. The new subjects that are introduced in the institution are made known to the various stake holders through the college prospectus. Hoardings and banners in different street junctions, advertisements in local T.V. channels and newspapers are a few methods to inform the common public about the objectives and methods of imparting education to the students.

4. What are the major considerations addressed to by the goals and objectives of the college? (Intellectual, Academic, Training, Access to the Disadvantaged, Equity, Self Development, Community & National Development, Ecology and Environment, Value Orientation, Employment, ICT introduction, Global Demands, etc.)

The goals and objectives of the college to impart higher education to women and empower them towards the future is addressed to by the college in many fold ways.

The following areas have received focused consideration-

- (i) Academic departments, through various courses offered including modern job oriented courses. The achievement of the institution is reflected in the success of its ex-students in gaining employment and eminence in various walks of life.
- (ii) To assist the students to integrate them as future work force of the country, various training and work experiences are provided in the neighbouring industries for professional courses.
- (iii) Special attention is given for overall intellectual development of students through participation in various workshops, lecture sessions organized in the college. The students are also encouraged and taken to other colleges and institutions to participate in different academic and extension programmes.
- (iv) Self development and social commitment of the students is encouraged through:
 - a. Given freedom to organize various cultural programmes thereby teaching them value of team work, importance of organizational schemes, planning and execution, different departments of the college encourage the students to produce independently wall magazines and other literary and cultural activities;
 - b. Participation in National Social Service Scheme;
 - c. Active assistance is provided to the Students Union so that they learn to think and work independently;

- d. Lecture sessions on value education organized by the college on different global and national issues such that education functions as an instrument of social transformation and an egalitarian social order. Students are encouraged to participate in community development program through NSS and department of Community Development of the college;
- e. Compulsory courses on environmental studies. The teachers give special attention on project works done by the students so that awareness on various environmental issues is developed in young minds;
- f. The institution always try to develop a tolerant attitude to multicultural and multilingual society of the country through its different co and extra curricular activities.
- 5. How are the institutional goals translated into the academic programmes, research and extension activities of the institution?
 - (i) The academic programmes of the college are based on the curriculum designed by the University of Burdwan. The curriculum itself bears the scope to carry on indepth knowledge and specialize in the subjects students opt for. Thus preparing them to pursue higher education in the specialized field.
 - (ii) Though no direct research activities are conducted in the college, the teachers engage in research works under the UGC schemes, individually.
 - (iii) Various social activities are organized by the students of the college which involve direct link with the neighbouring community. Regular blood donation camps, free health check-up camps are organized by the Students' Union to ensure the students constant involvement with social issuses. The curriculum gives a special focus to environment and ecology. The subject is made compulsory at the degree level to make the students aware of the need for protection of environment.
 - (iv) Through extention activities of the institution the commitment to the concept of equality within the landscape of cultural and socioeconomic nurtured among the students.

1.2 Curriculum Development

1. Specify the steps undertaken by the institution in curriculum development process.

The college is affiliated to the University of Burdwan and follows the curriculum developed and formulated by the Board of Studies of the University. However, the faculty members of various departments of the college attend the workshops and the meetings organized by the University from time to time regarding the formulation and upgradation of the curriculum. The teachers therefore transfer their thoughts and provide the information database from students and employees which highlight the needs of the students of this area in particular.

2. State specifically the curricular design and model adopted by the college in the organization of its curricula. What system does the institution follow?

The college follows the annual system of examination determined by the University. A University examination is held after each year for the 3 year degree course run in this college. It therefore follows the 1+1+1 pattern of evaluation. Other than this, unitwise evaluation are made throughout the year and preparatory tests in the college are held before all University examinations.

3. How are the global trends in higher education reflected in the curriculum?

From the academic year 2006 there has been a major change in the curriculum of the under graduate studies. This change has tried to address the current global needs and concerns, such as: in Physics more modern topics like digital electronics, in English literature writings of modern Indian writers, in History, history of science are a few examples to cite. The curriculum provide to the students an in-depth knowledge in the fields of study they want to specialize. It inculcates a research orientation in the minds of the young learners. Subjects like Environmental Studies are made compulsory to create awareness of the emerging crises that our world is facing. The choice of two general subjects along with an honours subject helps to recreate an interest in interdisciplinary approach which is undoubtedly a global trend in higher education. To provide and all round education all students have to opt one Modern Indian language and English as compulsory optional in the first yearof her study.

4. How does the institution ensure that the curriculum bears some thrust on national development?

The goal of national development can be achieved only through creation of a large pool of knowledge enabled human resources. The curriculum is thus framed for both dissipation of information as well as concept building. The college plays a significant role in shaping the changes to the advantage of the country and to contribute to the development of the nation. Seminars are held in the institution on various social issues, debate competitions arranged on current topics to ensure social involvement and responsibility towards the country and the concepts of humanism, secularism, tolerance, equality is consciously inculcated among the students along with the imparting of knowledge. The college has been successfully producing students, who have established themselves in academic, administrative as well as in different other fields thus contributing to national development, both explicitly and implicitly.

5. What are the contributions of the institution in curriculum design and development of the various programs?

The faculty members of the various departments of the college participate in the workshops organized by the affiliating University before the formulation of the curriculum. The teachers of this college have remained members of the Board of Studies from time to time.

6. What are the interdisciplinary courses introduced during the last five years?

Three year degree course have been introduced in Microbiology(Honours) which offers study in inter disciplines like Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Physics. Other interdisciplinary courses introduced in the last five years are Mathematics(Honours), Nutrition(Honours) and Computer Science (Honours). More over compulsory Environmental Studies for the students studying under graduate courses (BA, B.Sc. and B.Com.) made the course totally interdisciplinary.

- 7. What value added courses are introduced which would
 - (a) develop skills- Courses such as Bachelor in Computer Applications (B.C.A), Computer Science(Honours) develop skills among students.
 - (b) offer career training— The students are offered the UGC sponsored three year Certificate Course which they pursue along with the general degree course in:
 - 1) Functional English
 - 2) Travel and Tourism Management
 - 3) Community Development

The B.C.A department organizes work training for the students in the neighbouring industries as a part of their course curriculum.

- (c) *promote community orientation* Environmental Studies which is a compulsory subject in degree courses offered to the students promote community orientation. The UGC sponsored three year certificate Course in Community Development also aims at community orientation.
- 8. What percentage of the courses focus on experimential learning including practical and work experience?

About 33.3% of the courses run in the college focus on experimental learning including practical and work experience.

Moreover, educational tours are organized by various departments like Geography, Zoology and Botany which involve practical experiences.

The B.C.A department arranges for the students work experience in collaboration with the neighbouring industries.

9. *Is there a provision for incorporating computer training for all students?*

Though there is no provision for computer training for all the students at present, the college is keen to set up a computer centre inside the premises in near future. This will impart fundamental knowledge of computers to all students.

10. What are the courses aiming to promote value education?

The curriculum aims both at the development of skills as well as value systems among the students. The teachers consciously play a role in imbibing values commensurate with social,

cultural, economic and environmental realities at the local, national and international levels. The teachers modify and re-modify the modes and methods of teaching in keeping with the changing society.

The college arranges lecture sessions on value education from time to time to inculcate universal core values like truth and righteous conduct among the students.

11. What thrust is given to 'Information Communication Technology' in the curriculum for equipping the students for global demands?

The college has opened a three year degree course in Computer Science, and B.C.A for catering to the needs of the students. These courses in ICT equip the students to meet the global demands in this era of technological advancement.

1.3 Programme Options

1. What are the ranges of programme options available to learners in terms of Degrees, Certificates and Diplomas? Give the cut off percentage for admission at the entry level.

Under the existing rule of the affiliating university a student can opt for one subject as honours carrying 800 marks and two subsidiary subjects carrying 300 marks each or she can study three subjects each carrying 300 marks as a general course. Moreover one has to study compulsory subjects:

- (i) 50 marks of English language and literature,
- (ii) 50 marks of any Modern Indian language and
- (iii) 50 marks of environmental studies.

Cut off percentage for admission at the entry level: 45% for Hons. , 30% for General Programmes.

2. What programmes are offered for employees / professionals in terms of training for career advancement?

The programmes offered for employees/ professionals in terms of training for career advancement are:

i) Refresher Course ii) Orientation programme iii) Various Workshops on relevant issues conducted by Academic Staff College of different Universities or University and other colleges.

These courses are conducted by the Academic Staff College of different Universities such as the University of Calcutta, Jadavpur University, The University of Burdwan, etc.

3. Does the college provide twinning programme? Give details.

The college provides twinning programme:

- i) Teachers from other colleges are invited to deliver lectures on certain topics.
- ii) Teachers of this college (Asansol Girls' College) deliver their lectures in other colleges.
- 4. What programmes are available for international students?

The college allows any eligible candidate of any other country to receive education from this college in any discipline. The programmes are open to all international students.

5. Does the institution make use of Internet for transacting educational programme? Has the institution developed any educational package for the students' use?

The connectivity of the place is very weak. As a result student can not access internet for their academic or other purpose. However the college is working to be connected by broadband.

6. Does the institution offer any self-financing programmes in the institution? If yes, list them.

1.4 Academic Flexibility

1. Does the institution provide flexibility to pursue the programme with reference to the time frame (flexible time for completion)?

The institution is affiliated under the University of Burdwan and strictly follows the timeframe formulated by the University. Usually the students have to complete the course within a duration of three years. Students can take at most five years to complete the programme as per University rule.

2. Does the institution have any provision for slow and disadvantage learners? If yes for what courses?

No separate course is conducted for slow and disadvantaged learners in the college. However, the teachers try to reach to these learners through individual support, interaction and inter personal relationship.

3. How does the college distinguish between slow and advanced learners? Explain how additional help is provided to the slow learners to cope with the programme? How are the advanced learners facilitated to meet the challenges?

The college distinguishes between slow and advanced learners by the performances of the students in different examinations. Each Honours Department usually convene Parents'—Teacher Meeting to discuss their wards' overall performances and guardians of the slow performing students are appraised of their wards' drawback including measures for their improvement.

4. Does the institution provide flexibility to the students to move from one discipline to the other?

After the completion of the admission procedure, the students are informed through a general notice and verbally in classes by the teachers that willing students may change discipline according to their choice prior to the University registration subject to availability of seats and fulfilling the eligibility criteria.

5. Does the institution provide facilities for credit transfer, if the students migrate from one institution to another institution in or outside the country?

Credit transfer is allowed within the state after having migration certificate if the transfer is from one University to the other.

- 6. Does the institution provide (a.) Core options (b.) Elective options?
 - a) Core options: Elective Bengali, Elective English, Elective Hindi. Under the curriculum structure designed by the affiliating University, the college provides Honours courses in Arts, Science and Commerce streams. This is a course which attempts to specialize a learner in a specific subject. Other than the Honours course, a student can pursue studies in General courses.
 - b) Elective options:
 - In B.A.- History , Philosophy, Political Science, Economics, Geography and Sanskrit.
 - (ii) In B.Sc.- Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Computer Science, Zoology, Botany, Microbiology, Economics.
 - (iii) B. Com

The institution obtains information from

- (a) Students Feedback from students are obtained through direct questions, confidential questionnaires answered by students regarding administrative and overall impression of the college, complaint boxes are also a source for feedback from students. The grievance redressal cell functions regularly in monitoring the feedback and the college administration takes action accordingly.
- (b) Alumni The Alumni association of the college holds regular meetings, and organizes various programmes which reach out to ex – students of the college. Direct link of this association with the college administration is also a source of feedback.

- (c) Employer Feedback from employers is not available at the moment.
- (d) Community Close interactions are there between the neighbouring community and the college. The academic and natural environment of Asansol Girls' College is talked of frequently as an example.
- (e) Academic peers The feedback from academic peers are obtained as and when any University inspection team visits the college. External examiners in practical papers are much impressed with the systematic arrangement of the departments and the neat and clean environment of the college.
- (f) Industry There is no mechanism to obtain feedback from industry as such.

These feedbacks are reflected in the various meetings and workshops attended by the faculty members of the college for the formulation of curriculum and the changes brought in it. In terms of feedback use by the college, various department introduce seminar lectures by the students and sessions of MCQ question answers.

3. Which courses had major syllabus revision during the last five years? (with change in title and content)

Almost all of the courses had major syllabus revision during the last five years.

The college does not have any scope for quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures as the curriculum modifications are designed and formulated by the University to which the college is affiliated. The institution always take initiative for quality enhancement in curriculum in different board meeting of the affiliating University.

The best practices in 'Curricular Aspects' involve regular interactive sessions, students' seminar, literary clubs which regularly functions for quality enhancement of the students.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs

1. Is there a provision for assessing student's knowledge/ needs and skills before the commencement of the teaching programme?

On individual capacity every teacher judges the skills and needs of the students before the commencement of the teaching programme in her/his own way. But there is no formalization of the process till now.

2. Does the institution provide bridge courses to the educationally disadvantaged students?

No. The institution has not been able to organize any bridge course for educationally disadvantaged students.

3. What remedial measures are taken for the students from the disadvantaged communities?

Although no such provision is made for any particular section of students, the needs of all students are attended to with great care.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

1. How does the institution plan and organize the teaching learning evaluation schedule into the total scheme? Do you have an academic calendar? How is it prepared?

Under the new 1+1+1 pattern, before every university examination, the college holds tests to assess the student's progress, knowledge and preparation for the final exam. Other than that, class tests are routinely held so that the students are always made aware of their progress or otherwise. The institution has designated this responsibility to individual departmental coordinators.

Regular intra departmental meetings are held by the departmental community. This is done in keeping with the academic calendar which is prepared at the beginning of every academic year by a special committee. But dates for internal examinations are fixed after the university announces the dates of various term end examinations.

2. What courses use predominantly the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what other methods of teaching-learning are provided to students?

Subjects in the Humanities and Commerce groups use mostly the lecture method. Science subjects and other practical-based subjects use the lecture method and have practical classes also. They use overhead-projectors, slides, models, maps and computer where feasible to help class-room teaching. Students are taken for educational excursions conducted by the respective departments.

3. How is learning made student-centered? Give a list of the participatory learning activities adopted by the college, which contribute to self-management of knowledge development and skill formation?

The college ensures that both learning and teaching in the college is made student centered.

- (i) Every year students organize an annual social function where subject-oriented stalls and exhibitions are set up by each department. Prizes are also awarded to the best performances so as to encourage a healthy spirit of competition.
- (ii) Students are encouraged to organize seminars in the departments where students and teachers from local colleges are invited. They are also motivated to participate in intercollege competition, and educational seminars. Teachers also ensure that students actively participate in workshops and seminars organized by various colleges.
- (iii) Participation in various State-level competitions in extra-curricular activities. In the ninth state-level Youth Parliament Competition for colleges organized by the

- Department of Parliamentary Affairs, Govt. of WB, the team from our college won the first prize at the zonal as well as at the state-level.
- (iv) Participation in debates in their own college and those organized by other colleges.
- (v) Participation in lecture competition in neighbouring colleges, sometimes in collaboration with Saha Institute of Nuclear Physics(SINP), Kolkata on International year of Physics contributed to knowledge development and interacting skill of the students.
- 4. What modern teaching aids are used in classroom instruction as well as other student learning experiences?

Overhead projectors, slides, maps, charts and sometimes computers are used by different departments to make classroom teaching more effective and interesting.

5. Is there a practice of having tutorial classes for the students? If yes, for what courses?

Tutorial classes are held regularly for honours courses in Humanities and Commerce departments. Practical recapitulations in laboratory based subjects are a regular phenomena.

6. How is the academic process of each student monitored by the teacher in charge?

The academic progress of each student is monitored by the teacher through interactivesessions during classroom-teaching, tutorials, class-tests and parent-teacher meetings. In laboratory based subjects group discussions and answers to FAQ are discussed.

7. Give details of the course by sessions of work assigned and implemented in the tutorial session.

At the beginning of every month the students are informed of the different topics for study that will be taken up in weekly honours tutorials. After preparation by students, such topics are taken up for detailed study in class.

8. How do the students and faculty keep pace with the recent developments in the subjects?

Teachers attend Refresher Courses, Orientation courses, different seminars and workshops to acquaint themselves with the latest development in their subjects. They also use the library facilities, different journals and periodicals offered by the college.

Students receive information from their teachers according to the needs of their syllabi, which is regularly updated by the university.

9. Are there departmental libraries for the use of faculty and students? If yes, give details.

Yes. Each department has a small library of its own maintained by departmental teachers. Books are issued from this library for the students' use.

10. Has the library working hours been scheduled to enable the students for maximum utilization of the library facility? Give details.

Yes, the college library remains open on all working days, including recess periods. The students can therefore make full use of the library.

2.4 Teacher Quality

1. How are the members of the faculty selected? Does the college have the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses? If not, how do you cope with the requirements?

Full-time permanent teachers are selected by the West Bengal College Service Commission (a Statutory Body), Part-time, Temporary and Contractual teachers are selected by a committee comprising of university experts, members of the governing body of the college after advertising in national and local newspapers

The college has a substantial number of permanent full-time teachers. If, however, vacancies do arise, the college has resources to appoint temporary, part-time teachers to ensure that students' needs are met with and courses are completed in due time.

2. How does the college appoint substitutes/ additional faculty to teach existing and new programmes? How many such appointments were made during the last year?

The college appoints part-time and contractual teachers according to Govt. rules through a committee comprising of members of the Governing Body, University Experts and Departmental Coordinators. The number of such appointments in the academic session 2006-07 is Twenty Two (22).

3. What efforts are made by the management to promote teacher development? (eg: research grants, study leave, deputation to national/international conferences/ seminars, in service training, organizing of national/international conferences etc).

Teachers are granted study leave and encouraged to take facility of F.I.P. under the U.G.C. scheme to enable them to pursue higher studies and research work as per university rules. They are also granted leave and other facilities to attend national/international seminars, conferences, refresher courses and orientation programs.

4. What are the teaching innovations made in the last five years? How are innovations rewarded?

Departments are active for frequent interdisciplinary seminars in the college and question answer sessions are very lively in those seminars. Debates and performing arts in literature subjects have been introduce in the teaching process. Newspaper cutting on current issues are displayed in social sciences and field survey is encouraged in geography.

5. Does the institution have any policy to ensure representation of women among the staff? Give details.

Selections and appointments are made strictly on the basis of merit of the appropriate authorities. There is no scope for ensuring representation of women specially on the staff. However women men ratio is greater than unity, the institution is exclusively for women.

6. List the faculty who have been recognized for excellence in teaching during the last five years?

No such recognition for any faculty member of the college has been awarded.

Teachers and non-teaching staff of the college were offered a week's computer training programme organized by the Computer Science Department of the college in the summer recess of 2004. A few teachers have also taken Refresher Course in Computer Science/Application. One or two teachers have attended the UGC sponsored computer training programme organized by the University of Burdwan.

2.5 Evaluation of Teaching

1. Does the institution/ management evaluate teachers on teaching and research performance? How does the evaluation help in the improvement of teaching and research?

The institution invites yearly self-appraisal reports from teachers and such reports are reviewed. Meetings are held after the scrutiny of the self-appraisal reports. Although teachers are released from time to time for research work, the under-graduate college is not in a position to evaluate their research performance.

2. Has the institution introduced evaluation of the teachers by the students? If yes, how is the feed back analyzed and implemented for the improvement of teaching-learning?

The college has a system of evaluating teachers' performance by students, through filling up confidential forms for out-going final year students which are opened after such students leave the college. The grievance cell of the college give access to ventilate the problems of the students about class teaching among other things. The coordinators of different departments and the head of institution take note of such problems and talk to teachers to improve teaching-learning process.

3. Does the institution promote self-appraisal of teachers?

Yes.

4. Is the appraisal by the teachers reviewed by the Head of the Institution and used for improving the quality of teaching?

Yes, the appraisal by the teachers is reviewed by the Head of the Institution and measures for improvement discussed with coordinators of the departments and conveyed to individual teachers. The forms are forwarded to the University.

5. Does the institution conduct academic audit of the departments?

No such provision is there till now.

6. Based on the recommendations of the academic audit what specific measures have been taken by the institution to improve the teaching, learning and evaluation?

Not Applicable.

7. What significant innovations in teaching and learning are introduced by the institution?

Students from several departments make use of slides (video) and overhead projectors. They are also regularly taken to near-by sites and also to various parts of the country for educational field trips.

There are seminars, wall magazines, illustrated talks that supplement the lecture methods of teaching.

2.6 Evaluation of Learning

1. How does the institution monitor the performance of the students? (Annual Exam/ Semester Exam, Trimester Exam, Midterm Exam, Continuous Assessment, Final Exam, etc.,)

Each department arranges bimonthly class tests after the session begins. Under the old examination pattern, half-yearly, annual, and tests were held without fail. However, the new 1+1+1 pattern does not allow scope for annual exams at the college level. Therefore

test exams and class tests are held to ensure that the students are able to keep pace with class teaching. At the beginning of every session teacher council meets to discuss this issue.

2. Are the evaluation methods communicated to the students at the beginning of the year? If yes, how?

University notices concerning examination matters are prominently displayed and explained to the students. On the orientation day for the students, at the beginning of every academic session, the Principal gives them an idea about the academic schedule of the session. As a result, the students are fully aware of their responsibilities. The need for students to appear in all examinations is emphatically stated and accordingly internal examinations are held in the college. Almost all teachers of the college are part of final University Examination processes. So, they are well aware of the evaluation method of the University Examination while the scripts of the internal examination are shown to the students, the evaluation method of the University is also discussed.

3. What is the method of evaluation followed? (Central, Door, Double evaluation, etc.)

The scripts are examined by the door evaluation by the University. It appoints examiners from different colleges to evaluate the answer scripts. However for the evaluation of scripts for last and final exam the University organizes central evaluation.

4. How frequently are the class tests conducted?

Tests are held before every University examination once every year. In the interim period class tests are held mostly once in a fortnight.

5. What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation?

At the college level the students are allowed to see their evaluated scripts, so that there is no scope for grievance regarding evaluation.

At the university level, the students can apply for and have their scripts reviewed or scrutinized as per University rules.

6. How does the institution prepare the students for final exams?

Regular attendance is strongly emphasized so that they attend all class lectures. Tutorial classes are held as a means of special help. Class tests are frequently held to ensure better performance. They are also motivated to use the library to widen the sphere of their knowledge. Advanced learners are provided with advanced study material to keep up their interest.

Moreover in laboratory based subject before practical examination practice on experiments are done by the students for recapitulation of the procedures.

7. Does the institution communicate the evaluation outcome to the parents?

Regular parent-teacher meetings are held to inform them of their wards performance. Report cards are issued after each examination.

2.7 Evaluation Reforms

1. Has the institution carried out any evaluation reforms?

Yes.

The college being affiliated to the University of Burdwan follows the pattern of evaluation offered by the University. However changes are introduced by the University and the college follows them. From the year 2000 a significant change has been introduced in the evaluation pattern. Objective type questions carrying 30% marks are to be answered by the students separately in a paper of 100 marks of theoretical paper in the final examination. A system of central evaluation has also been introduced for final examination to speed up the process of publication of results from the year 2002.

2. What are the reforms taken up with reference to evaluation? (Double Evaluation, Question Bank, Moderation etc.)

Various departments prepare their own question banks for the use of the students and question banks from the University are also available in the college library.

3. How does the institution make the evaluation process transparent?

The college allows students to see their examined answer script. Report cards of internal examinations are given to students requiring their guardians signature. The students can apply for a review of papers of final University examinations through proper channel (college).

4. Do you have continuous assessment? If yes, please specify the weightage.

Though the University does not give any weightage to marks obtained in the internal examinations of the college, yet the college insists on maintaining a continuous process of students evaluation. However results of these examinations are duly considered when any student fails to appear in the colleges' term end examination.

3. Criterion III: Research, Consultancy & Extension

3.1 Promotion of Research

1. Is there a Research Committee to facilitate and monitor research activity?

No research committee is there till now but the college is organizing it-self so that this type of committee can be formed. A committee to examine and discuss the prospect of research on different local issues and the scope of availing UGC projects will be formed in near future.

2. How does the institution promote faculty participation in research?

The Institution is always liberal enough to release any teacher with full facility if he/she got any chance for F.I.P. or any other research oriented programme. In fact the institution is gearing it self up to start a tribal research centre in the college.

3. What provision is made in the budget for research and development?

As there is no research project in the college, there is no question of budget allocation.

4. Does the institution promote participation of the students in research through the academic programme?

Some departments, specially English literature and Social Science departments always motivate their students to involve in research oriented activities. In the annual function of the college this year, the English department put up their stall on a very interesting topic, 'Origin and history of Nursery Rhymes'. The department of English also proposes to take up a research project under UGC scheme on 'Teaching English in Indian Classrooms' and involve students in the research work.

5. What are the major research facilities developed and available on the campus?

Till now no major research facility has been developed in the campus but department of social sciences is eager to establish a tribal research center in the campus.

6. Does the institution subscribe to research journals for reference as per the different departmental requirements?

Yes, though in a very small scale.

Classrooms and administrative buildings are adequate for the existing need and the structure is getting expanded due to introduction of new programs.

Water is supplied from a deep well inside the college campus in addition to supply from PHE and Asansol Municipal Corporation and all the buildings, Labs, Hostels Staff Quarters and canteen are fed with 24 hrs running water. Power Supply is supplemented by a generator whenever there is any power failure. As the city is well connected both by road and train transportation system the need for separate transport facility for students is not required.

- 2. What are the infrastructure facilities available for

 - (b) Co-curricular activities
 - (c) Sports
 - a) Rooms are spacious, a public address system of the college can be used as and when required. Overhead projectors and computers can be used for academic purposes. Xerox facilities, is available in the college campus for students. Number of classrooms and number of laboratories are adequate to meet the existing requirements. The libraries have the reading room facilities both for the morning section and day section. Moreover the library will be shifted to a larger space very soon.
 - b) A large open air theatre of the college can be used for cultural functions and for extra-curricular activities. A seminar hall is there for seminar and conferences.
 - c) The college has a sprawling play ground and a small badminton court. Provision of indoor games are there in the common room of the students. A room is earmarked for

storing the sports materials in the college. Athletic requirements for the students' practice are sufficient.

3. Has the institution augmented the infrastructure to keep pace with academic growth? If yes, specify the facilities and the amount spent during the last five years.

The college infrastructure is being constantly augmented and efficiently maintained through funds received from various agencies such as UGC, MP Local Area Development Fund, MLA Fund. Plans are there to tie up with eminent Alumni and the local industries to create a network of support through sponsorships and awards. During the last five years the building of the college has been expanded considerably. It is about 17003 **Sqft.** The amount spent on this purpose **during the last five years is Rs.7812433/.**

4. Does the institution provide facilities like common room, wash / rest rooms for women students and women staff?

The college is exclusively for girl students and adequate arrangements for above mentioned facilities are present.

- 2. How optimally is the budget allocated and utilized?

Needs of different departments are judiciously considered in the meeting of Finance Committee (a Statutory body) and allotments on different heads are decided. For developmental work there is a Development Committee in the college to discuss

importance of different developmental activities . All the expenses are sanctioned by the Finance Committee. The accounts are audited regularly by external auditor. No system of internal auditing has been introduced.

3. Does the institution appoint the staff for maintenance and repair? If not, how are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipment maintained?

The staff of most of the departments maintain their own equipment / machines and thus there is no need for expensive maintenance contracts with outside agencies. However for major repair and for any expansion work in building etc,outside agencies are appointed.

4. How is the infrastructure optimally used?

Classrooms are rented out for holding various entrance and competitive examinations. Also a PCO has been installed within the campus on rental basis. The Government of West Bengal uses the building for PSC and other examinations. The Election Commission uses the building for General Election.

4.3 Library as Learning Resources

1. Does the library have an advisory committee? What are its functions?

Yes.

The library advisory committee functions under a convenor. Meetings are held at regular intervals to discuss demand of books, allocation of budget, upgradation of library system etc. Actions are taken according to the decisions taken in these meeting. Number of text books, about 29362 are arranged in open stacks and students can use those through the help of library staff and catalogues of the respective subjects.

2. How does the library ensure access, use and security of materials?

(a) Access:

The main guide to locate books in the library is the author catalogue. In the author catalogue the card are arranged under the names of the authors/editors/translators for every book in the library. All the cards in the author catalogue are arranged in alphabetic Sequence as in a Dictionary. The Dewey Decimal System is used in this purpose.

A book is located by its call number which appears on the top left hand corner of the catalogue card. There are two reading rooms in the library. One is used by the students and other is used by the faculty members. Same system is followed in the morning library.

(b) Use:

Two library cards are issued to the students through a proper notice ,one card is for borrowing and the other card is for reference use in the reading room. Each card bears the

passport size photograph of the students. The students can borrow books from the Central Library only.

(c) Security:

To borrow a book students should write the name of the author, title of the book, call no., accession no. on a printed requisition slip which is available in the circulation counter. All books in the library are arranged according to class. The loan card is to be surrendered at the circulation counter whenever a book is borrowed. The book issued to a student for home reading must be returned within ten(10) days from the date of issue. A book may be re-issued provided that there is no other demand for the book. If the students are found to be retaining the books beyond specified period their library card will be suspended for a particular period as per rules of the library.

However no fire extinguisher can be installed till now. Efforts are going on in this regards in the new library building.

- 3. What are the facilities available in the library? (computers, internet, reprographic facilities etc.,)
 - (a) The library has computer and printer facilities.
 - (b) The library has reprographic facilities.
 - (c) Internet facility will be available in the library very shortly.
- 4. How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, important journals and other reading materials?

In the budget of the college there is fixed allocation for books and journals. Besides if there is any special requisition for books from any department due to any changes in courses or introduction to new programs special library allotment is released in the meeting of the Governing Body of the college. For example, due to introduction of Honours course in physics the Governing Body has allotted a sum of Rs. 50000/-for purchase of books as a special case.

5. If the library has an archives section, to what extent is it used by the readers and researchers?

The library has no archives section at this moment.

6. How are on-line and internet services in the library used by students and faculty? Specify the hours and frequency of use.

Since there is no internet connection available at present, the students are encouraged to use the internet facility outside college, and in the BCA department although in a restricted

way. Moreover, the college has the intention of connecting with the broadband as early as possible.

7. Are the library services computerized? Does the institution make use of INFLIBNET / DELNET/IUC facilities? If yes, give details.

The library is partially computerized and no use of INFLIBNET/DELNET/IUC facilities is there.

8. How many days is the library kept open in an academic year? How many hours is the library open per day?

In the last academic year there were 257 working days in the college. All the working days including the recess the library is kept open. It is open from 10A.M. to 5P.M. The working hours for the library in the morning section is 7A.M. - 12 noon. The books of the two libraries are interchangeable and the students of the morning section can use the reading room of the day section.

10. How does the library motivate students/ teachers to read existing and new arrivals?

For existing materials catalogues of different subjects can be searched and some information can be obtained from the computer also. Newly arrived books and journals are displayed on the board. When a new session begins an induction meeting in the library is under consideration. The system of displaying a list of best readers is under consideration.

11. What are the special facilities offered by the library to the visually disabled and physically challenged persons? How are they used?

No such facility is available at this moment in the library, low benches for physically challenged will be installed in a separate space in the new building of the library.

12. List the infrastructural development of the library over the last five years?

The existing space for the library is inadequate. Very shortly the library will be shifted to new sprawling space. The construction for new library building is going on full scale. The institution is much eager to provide internet facility for the student after having broadband internet connection.

13. What are the information services provided by the library to the users?

Library informs about different competitive examinations, new publications, seminars etc. through notices on display boards.

4.4 Computers as Learning Resources

1. How is the computer facility extended to all faculty and students?

As the library is waiting for broadband internet connection, the faculty and the students can use the Computer Science Department in a restricted way. However printing facility is available in the central library. Total number of computer in the college being 44, including the Computer Science department, students can use computer as and when required.

2. How are the faculty facilitated to prepare computer aided teaching/learning materials? What are the facilities available in the college for such efforts?

The faculty members have not gone through any training to be competent enough to prepare computer aided teaching/learning materials. But efforts have been taken to arrange for such training of the faculty members. The teachers will be encouraged for training in multimedia and other computer aided courses for academic purposes.

3. Is there a central computing facility? If yes, how favourable are its timings, access and cost to both students and faculty?

The college has not been able to arrange for such facility so far but has applied for broadband internet connection to provide this facility.

4. How does the library collection meet the requirements of the users?

The library collection at its present status cannot meet the full requirements of the users. But after shifting to the new larger space the collection will be increased to a great extent. At present books student ratio in the library is **29362:3335**(including H.S. students).

5. How are the computers and its accessories maintained in the Departments?

The computers and its accessories are maintained by the faculty members and the technical staffs of the departments. If there be any major problem help from local service providers are sought for.

6. What is the output of the various Departments in developing packages for their discipline?

The Computer Science Department of the college has developed a package for the library use.

4.5 Other Facilities

1. How many students stay in the hostel? How many rooms are there in the hostel? Is the accommodation sufficient to meet the demand?

There are two hostels in the college and altogether 124 students stay in those hostels. The accommodation is not sufficient to meet the demand and the college is planning to extend the hostel facility.

2. What facilities are provided in the hostel?

Rooms are furnished with cot, reading chair and tables, fans, cupboards, 24 hours running water for washing etc. Morning tea, lunch, tiffin and dinner are prepared and served in one of the hostels and the mess is managed by the students themselves. In the other hostel meals are supplied by the college canteen on a subsidized rate.

3. What are the health care facilities available in the health centre?

The college has one part-time doctor for health checkups of the hostel boarders. When there is any emergency, help from local doctors and nursing homes (one or two of these are connected with alumni) are sought for to look after the students.

4. Does the institution have a placement centre? What are its functions and how does it facilitate students for getting employment and self-employment?

No, the institution has no placement centre. However, the college will soon be starting placement counselling centre with the help of the Alumni Association for the students. Moreover every year the college arranges for campus interview for professional courses. A good number of students has already been absorbed in companies like WIPRO, Cognizant Technology Solution and TATA Consultancy Services etc.

5. What are the physical and infrastructure facilities available for the sports and physical education centre?

The college has no formal sports and physical education center.

6. How does the institution ensure participation of women in intra and inter institution sports competitions?

The institution always encourage the students with example from national and inter national events for full exploitation of sports facilities to ensure participation in intra and inter institution sports competition. It may be mentioned here that students from this college are quite successful in different University level sports events.

7. Does the institution have a workshop / instrumentation centre? If yes, what are the physical and infrastructure facilities available in the centre?

The college does not have any workshops/ institutional center. The team of technical staff is active and competent enough for minors problems in equipments. However when there is any major problem help from local service providers is sought for.

10. How does the alumni contribute to the development of the institution?

Alumni have helped in the beautification of college, presented a display board in which names of the principals of this college since its inception are displayed. They hold meetings in the college campus on regular intervals. The annual conference of the Alumni Association is an important event in the college activities. With the help of the Alumni Association, a medical counselling centre is providing medical aid to the student once in a week. The association have decided to open a personal and professional counselling centre in the college campus.

- (b) Teachers' Council: The TC is formed with the members who are the whole time, permanent teaching staff of the college. The president of the council is the principal and the secretary and the asst. secretary are elected by the members from among themselves.
- (c) Students' Union: All the students of the college are the members of the SU. The students elect class representative (CRs) for each class. The CRs elect office bearers from among themselves for formation of six departments viz. Cultural, Games and athletics, Magazine and literature, Bijnan Parishad, Students Welfare and Social Service and Common room. One teaching staff is deputed by the principal as teacher in charge on each of the above departments.

Generally at least six meetings each of the GB and TC are held in an academic year. The meetings of the finance sub-committee, academic council and other sub-committees are held whenever specific issues arise.


4. How many of the management council resolutions are implemented?

All the resolutions of the Governing body are implemented.

5. How is the administration decentralized? Illustrate the organization chart.

The recommendations of the committees to function on the financial management, pension and retirement benefits of the employees including leave , building , construction and development are finally approved by the GB. In almost other functionaries regarding admission, examination , academic works and office works, the committees function independently.

6. Does the institution have effective internal coordination and monitoring mechanism? If yes, specify.

Yes, the institution rests upon secretary, TC and some key conveners of sub-committees for internal co-ordination and monitoring to run the college smoothly. The head clerks and the Bursar of the college supervise the office jobs of ministerial staff. The co-ordinator of the departments monitor routine on the theoretical and practical classes. Librarian and Asst. Librarian takes care of the library works.

The college has an efficient internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism. The mechanism consists of the followings:

- (i) The Principal and the Heads of the departments of different subjects are ensuring efficient coordination and monitoring.
- (ii) They monitor the departmental activities periodically.
- (iii) A number of planning sessions, departmental meetings and inter-departmental meetings are held to achieve this goal.
- (iv) Different core committees and sub committees have been framed by the Teachers' Council (a Statutory Body) to look after different academic aspects.
- (v) Administrative and allied activities viz. admission, examination, finance, games and sports, cultural activities, students' welfare programmes, seminars, hostel, students' grievances etc. The committees consist both teaching and non-teaching staffs and sometimes student's representation is sought.
- 7. How many times does the management meet the staff in an academic year?

There are representatives from teachers and non-teaching staffs in the Governing Body. The Principal, the Secretary of the GB, meets the faculty members and the non teaching staff on various occasions for academic and administrative management. Moreover any of the staff can meet the Governing Body as a whole on any specific issue after prior intimation through Principal .


1. Does the institution have a perspective plan for institutional development? How the various constituencies are involved in the process of planning?

6.4 Manpower Planning and Recruitment

1. How is the staff recruited? Illustrate the process.

The college employees are of three categories-

- (a) Principal, appointed by the Governing Body
- (b) Teaching Staff
- (c) Non-Teaching Staff

Recruitment of teachers:

Whenever a vacancy arises against sanctioned post by virtue of retirement/resignation/creation of new posts or otherwise, the requisition for the candidate to fill up the vacancy is placed at the office of the West Bengal College Service Commission (W.B.C.S.C). The Service Commission has been set up by the Govt. for interview, selection and recommendation of candidates. On the recommendation of the W.B.C.S.C. the Governing Body (G.B) of the college appoints a candidate to the post of lecturer.

Regarding the appointment to part-time, contractual teaching posts the vacancies are notified in the national and local newspaper and the college notice board. The selection committee constituted by the G.B. in terms with the University Guidelines under notification dated 30.06.2006 interviews the eligible candidates and prepares a panel with recommendation for appointment thereof. The G.B. appoints a part – time teacher finally on the recommendation of the selection committee.

Recruitment of non – teaching staff:

A vacancy against sanctioned post arising out of retirement/resignation/creation of new post or otherwise is communicated to the DPI, Govt. of W.B. for permission to fill up the vacant post. With the permission of the DPI,W.B. , the requisition for candidates is placed to the Office of the Employment Exchange. The Employment Exchange sponsored candidates are interviewed , selected and recommended by the Standing Committee, constituted by the University Statute under clause No. ST. 2(L & NT). On the recommendation of the Standing Committee, the G.B. appoints a candidate to the post of non-teaching staff. The procedure of the appointment to the post of Librarian / Assistant Librarian has been so far as above. However recently the recommendation to the post of Librarian / Asst. Librarian rests upon the W.B. C.S.C and the appointment is given to the selected candidates by the college authority.

Appointment of Part-time/ Casual Non Teaching Staff:

The selection made by the selection committee constituted by the G.B. and the appointment is given by the G.B. of the college.

2. How is the need for staff recruitment assessed?

The sanction and creation of the teaching post is judged on the basis of workload as per the G.O. No. 1159 Edn.(CS) dated 18.06.1969 and G.O. No. 974 Edn.(CS) dated 27.08.2001. The Govt. of W.B. has introduced Staff pattern of the colleges for sanction / creation of Non-teaching post including Librarian by the Govt. Order No. 830 Edn.(CS) dated 31.10.1995 judged on the basis of number of enrollment in the college, number of Laboratory based departments ,number of books in the library etc.

3. What percentage of faculty who are qualified from other institutions and other states are recruited?

Recently one faculty member in Hindi have been recruited by the college from the state, Uttar Pradesh. All the other faculty members are from same state.

All the faculty members excepting one in the faculty members in permanent post are from other institutions. But most of the part time teachers are from this institution.

4. What is the ratio of teachers to non-teaching staff?

The ratio of teachers to non-teaching staff is 91:24

6.5 Performance Appraisal

1. Does the college have a 'self-appraisal method' to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programmes? How far has it motivated the teachers?

The college has self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty of its own for scale promotion. The teachers are also motivated themselves to upgrade themselves by joining refresher course, orientation programme, seminars ,workshops etc. But the University of Burdwan evaluates the performance at an interval of six months. Every teacher has to fill up a proforma, supplied by the University, mentioning the details of period of service, bio-data, publications, research activities, attending seminars, workshops, participation in Refresher courses, teaching method, evaluation methods, participation in administrative work in the college, classes taken, leave, participation in Univ. exams. Etc. As the B.U. evaluates in this way, the teachers take classes regularly; they upgrade themselves to adopt up to date methodologies.

2. Does the institution appraise the performance of the teaching staff? If yes, specify.

Yes. The students are given exit confidential questionnaire to evaluate their teachers. The administrative heads often engage in informal conversation with guardians and other teachers in order to appraise the performance of the teaching staff.

6.6 Staff Development Programmes

Almost all the faculty of the college especially the lab-based departments and associated teachers have to use these aids for sake of syllabus. The college had organized a training course in computer fundamentals for the teachers with the help of the help computer science department in 2004 for motivating the faculty to use computer.

Yes, the operating budget is adequate to cover the day-to-day expenses.

3. Is the maintenance budget of the institution adequate with reference to its infrastructure and learning resources?

Yes, the maintenance budget of the institution is adequate with reference to its infrastructure and learning resources.

4. Does the institution have a mechanism for internal and external audit?

Yes, the institution does have a mechanism for internal (only for lab-based subjects) and external audit.

Internal audit: The lab-based departments are provided with some contingency amount (in Rs.) for day-to-day expenses. These departments ultimately submit the accounts of expenses with bills & vouchers to the account section of the college before the completion of the financial year. Finally the accounts section verify it.

External audit: The college appoints Govt. registered auditors for the audit of total income/expenditure of the college for every financial year.

5. Have the accounts been audited regularly?

Yes. The accounts of the college have been audited upto 2004-2005.

6. What are major audit objections? How are they complied with? Give details.

There are no major audit objections as such. They observed

- (i) The college should take necessary actions for insurance coverage on various important assets.
- (ii) The college management should take necessary action for adjustment of various advances which was shown in the Books of Accounts.

7. Criterion VII: Healthy Practices

7.1 Total Quality Management

1. How does the institution gear itself to achieve the specific goals and objectives?

To achieve the specific goals and objective this college has a plan to set up an 'Internal Quality Cell' for regular monitoring and assessment of the administrative and academic functions.

2. Has the institution adopted any mechanism/ process for internal quality checks? Give details.

The college endeavors to check internal quality by assessment of progress of the students through periodical examination. The students performance in their co-curricular and extracurricular activities are also assessed for their individual development through various competitions held at regular intervals. The academic subcommittee examines academic audit periodically.

There are different subcommittees to supervise office work and financial management, infrastructural development to ensure quality in every aspect of the institution. The college receives feedbacks from the students, guardians/parents, the alumni through questionnaires or otherwise to assess shortcoming, if any, as well as appreciation in the matter of academic and administrative progress.

3. How does the institution ensure the quality of its academic programmes?

To ensure the quality of the academic programme the college takes remedial measures appropriate to the situation in consultation with the concerned committees.

4. How does the institution ensure the quality of its administration?

The governing body of the college takes care of overall management of the administration. However the Principal supervises day to day administrative work for affective functioning of the ministrial staff and the faculty members for running the office, library and classes smoothly. He also acts as the liason person to contact with the eminent personalities for the purpose of administrative control relevant to the needs of the institution.

7.2 Innovations

1. What are the innovative courses planned during the last five years? How do you promote innovations in the curriculum?

The institution has kept in mind the changes in the global perspective and accordingly introduced need based programmes in the curriculum. During the last five years professional course like BCA and careeer oriented courses like functional English, Travel and Tourism Management, Community Development programmes have been introduced for the benefit of the students. Besides some other courses according to the demand of the time also have been introduced like Honours in Microbiology, Nutrition, Computer Science.

2. Describe the strategies evolved in promoting innovations in teaching, learning and evaluation.

The college pays attention to the promotion of innovative methods and ideas in the process of teaching, learning and evaluation (TLE). The faculty members are encouraged to attend Orientation programmes and Refreshers courses conducted by the Universities. The faculty members are also deputed to participate in the national and international workshops, seminars, symposiums to update their knowledge and skill. The largest group in the TLE are the students. The departments arrange interaction meeting with the student and their guardians to assess and obtain suggestions for the betterment of students. To imbibe creative ideas among the students they are encouraged to publish wall magazine, hold seminars, participate in the exhibitions inside and outside the college, make educational tours etc.

3. Elucidate some of the innovations in research and extension initiatives taken by the institution to give a significant thrust to research and development in the programmes.

The college has no research wing. However, it sanctions study leave with full pay to the teachers to enjoy teacher's fellow award under the FIP scheme of the UGC. Such study leave is also granted to them to carry out research work in the Universities and other institutions. They are also encouraged to undertake the minor/major projects under the Universities.

4. What strategies have been adopted in governance?

The college feels the necessity of launching E-governance. The college has computerized the office work and will soon try to implement E-governance in other areas of administration as well.

7.3 Value Based Education

1. What are the practices of the institution to impart value based education?

To inculcate social and moral values in the minds of the students the usual practices of the institutions are:

- (a) The NSS activities
- (b) Organization of Cultural programmes and social festival
- (c) On the days of national importance the college always try to put before the student the preamble of Indian Constitution. Different members of the faculty and the principal of the college often talk about different facilities granted in our constitution for the citizen of the country. Posters and debates on child labour, Universal literacy, Women empowerment are organized by the students. For example on 26th January 26, 2007 a talk on 'Indian Constitution and Democratic Values' will be delivered by a faculty member of department of Political Science.
- (d) Seminars from time to time.
- 2. What are the exclusive courses on value education? Or is it integrated into the existing courses appropriately?

There is no integrated or exclusive courses on value based education in the curriculum. However, the curriculum has integrated values systems and notions of righteous conduct to promote value based education.

7.4 Social Responsibilities and Citizenship Roles

1. How does the institution promote social responsibilities and citizenship roles among the students?

The institution promotes social responsibilities and citizenship roles among the students through the National Social Service scheme. The college students take part in social services voluntarily within the framework of NSS, under normal and special camping programmes. The college authority is trying its best to set up a National Cadet Corps Unit in the college in the current session. The Institution is proud enough that the students have achieved the first position in the state level Youth Parliament Competition.

2. What are the institutional efforts to bring in 'Community Orientation' in its activities?

The activities of NSS are usually oriented towards the community development. Visit to the tribal areas and slums is a part of the programme. Awareness of the social evils, health and hygiene, literacy in the surrounding areas are taken care of when there is annual activity programme in the neighbouring slum areas. With financial assistance from the University Grant Commission, the college has started certificate and diploma courses in Community Development. In their project work functioning of a NGO, BIDISHA in district of Purbo Midnapur, West Bengal.

3. Does the institution have any exclusive programme under extra-mural / enrichment wing, to promote social responsibilities and citizenship roles?

We have no exclusive programme to promote social responsibilities and citizenship roles other than extended service programme adopted by the NSS.

7.5 Overall Development

1. How does the institution involve all its stakeholders in planning, implementing and evaluating the academic programmes?

The representatives of Students' Union take part in process of planning, implementing and evaluating the academic programmes. All the students belong to the Students' Union. The elected members of the union constitute the Students' Council under the provision of the Burdwan University rules and regulations. The general secretary of the students union participate in the college governances as an ex-officio member. The college authority consults teachers and students as regards organization of different committees for the proper administration of the college.

2. What strategies are adopted for the effective management of human, financial, and other learning resources for the overall development of the students?

The teaching and non teaching staff of the college act as the human capital for the development of the college. The college authority with the permission of the Government takes step to fill up vacancies of the teaching and non teaching posts. It also approaches the government for the creation of additional post admissible on the basis of work load. The financial resource in the following ways

- (a) The students contribute tuition fees and others fees as prescribed by the college. The recurring and nonrecurring expenditures are made up from their funds.
- (b) The Government of West Bengal provides payments of the employees.
- (c) The State Government, University Grant Commission, grants of local MPs, MLAs, and Local Development Bodies grant resource whenever necessary.

The financial resources are managed by priority basis budget allocation and optimum utilization of the available facility.

3. How does the institution ensure overall development of the students considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research-development, community orientation, and the personal and spiritual development of the students?

The faculty staff, technical and office staff, ministerial and other staff discharge their duties properly in their respective areas of service. They also share their duties with overall understanding with each other. The involvement of the student in the management of the college strengthens the fulfillment of the overall development of the college.

7.6 Institutional Ambience and Initiatives

1. What measures have been taken by the institution to create the institutional ambience for teaching and learning?

As the aim of any Educational Institution is to ignite to passion for quest of knowledge and perfection, the college has taken the following measures to create the ambiance of teaching and learning.

- (a) Teachers try to use interactive method of teaching in classroom as far as practicable;
- (b) In practical classes of laboratory based subjects are encouraged to understands the underline principle that formed the basis of experiment, rather than teaching her to work it out mechanically;
- (c) As a matter of policy students are encouraged to raise questions during lecture session;
- (d) Seminars, workshops are organized on a regular basis to inculcate habit of academic arguments;
- (e) Students are encouraged to participate in debates quiz in an outside the college;

- (f) Teachers are encouraged to attain orientation courses; Seminars, workshops in and outside the state:
- (g) Strict discipline is maintained in the campus;
- (h) Regular internal examinations are held and the answer sheets are shown to the students:
- (i) Every effort is made to maintain cordial relationship among the teaching, non-teaching and student members of the college;
- (j) All the departments of the college put up stalls in the annual function of the college. The innovative ideas of the young minds from all corners of the academic field are expressed in those stalls. At these stalls all students and teachers and the community outside the college interact with each other in open mind on every questions.
- 2. Has the institution made any initiative to have a technologically advanced infrastructure to make 'learning' an effective process?

As regards the technologically advanced infrastructure the use of teaching aid like projectors and computers make the learning effective and interactive.

3. Has the institution done a gender audit and / or any gender related sensitizing courses for the staff/students?

Being exclusively a girls' college it does not take up gender audit separately. The college does not run any gender related courses but have a plan to introduce the discipline of Women Studies in near future.

4. Are there any other measures taken by the institution to make it a learner friendly system?

In view of asking teaching learning student friendly some measures are mentioned here:

- (a) Interaction of students and teachers outside the classroom.
- (b) Arrangement of group discussion and seminar.
- (c) Arrangement of special classes besides regular routine classes
- (d) Breakup of the syllabus into modules.
- (e) Class tests and tutorials are arranged to improve the writing skills of the students.











Viva-voce is taken after every laboratory session for conceptualization of the topic on which she was working.

Moreover she is closely associated with a NGO (Sekhar Sathi) trying to tune Primary Education of rural Bengal according to the model of National Curriculum Framework (NCF) 2005.
- b. In November, 2006 the faculty member took the students to Kolkata to join a programme conducted by NCSTC for the students of 1st year Physics honours to inculcate scientific temperament among the young students. The students visited different scientific laboratories; expert persons demonstrated how Physics can be fun,there were lectures by eminent speakers also. They gathered much encouragement from this programme. Returning back from the programme with much enthusiasm they arranged for the departmental stall in the annual function and stood first.

After the introduction of self-financing Engineering courses in West Bengal, there was an initial euphoria among plus two science students of joining such courses, this has geopardised the prospect of science education particularly in this college and generally in whole of India. The matter is reflected in high dropout rates in this college.



Functional English

A Brief Report

During the session 2004-2005, the college obtained permission from the UGC to run a certificate course in Functional English under the scheme of Career Oriented Course promoted by the commission. These courses are run by the institution for its students. The students can therefore pursue both the degree as well as this course simultaneously. The first session had 10 students and the success rate was 100%. Since this is a newly started course, the student strength is considerably less in number. However, the college is keen to make known about this course through a variety of publicity measures like regular notices in the college display board, leaflets and the college prospectus. The course coordinator has directly contributed in the formulation of the syllabus in collaboration with the Burdwan University. The college has recruited one part time teacher to take the classes on Saturdays, Sundays and calendar holidays.

The students are provided with classroom lectures using audio-visual aids. Word maps, scheming, project work, teacher-student interaction, working on seen and unseen passages are a few innovative ways followed in this course. The course focuses on enhancing the written and conversational skills of the under-graduate students. Group discussions and debates are organized on a regular basis to give an edge in personality development. The teachers try to monitor the development of individual students. To assess student participation and interactive skills, class tests in the form of both written and viva-voce are held. The department possesses about ten books in its library which is meagre. It is, however, determined to build its own seminar library in near future. Interactive CDs are brought from the BBC to help students gear up their listening and conversational skills. A major thrust is given to personality development and skills of management are imbibed to ensure better options in career opportunities.

As the department has started functioning only recently, there are a large number of future plans of action which are yet to be realized. It has a plan of collaborating with neighbouring industries to provide in-course training and help the students in placements. Eminent experts in this field will be asked to deliver lectures and conduct work shops under the faculty exchange programme. Introduction of modern ICT aided teaching and building up of a language laboratory is also under consideration.

BEST PRACTICE

1. Title of the practice: Grievance Redressal Cell

Formation of a Grievance Redressal Cell to maintain a transparency in its activities and to make the students more comfortable in the place of learning, the college decided to form a grievance redressal cell where the students can freely express their grievances through complaint letters.

2. The context that required initiation of the practice

Since the last few years, the financial crunch at the Government level augmented the depleted infrastructure in terms of laboratories, human resource & teaching learning aids. The college observed its reaction among the student stakeholders and decided to channalise the grievances in a formal manner and maintain official documentation of the complaints. It was under this context that this cell started operating in its our accord.

3. Objectives of the practice

The objectives of the grievance redressal cell are as follows:

- to ensure a transparency in the activities of the college.
- to help the college in formulation of future plan of action.
- priorities issues and determine the course of action.
- this mechanism enhance the student-administration interaction.

4. The Practice

The practice involves setting up of complaint boxes at the corridors of the college where the students may drop their complaint letters regarding infrastructural facilities, mode of teaching or any discomfiture faced by the students of the college. A grievance redressal cell is set up by the teachers' council comprising of members of the faculty and the head of the institution which hold meetings at regular intervals in which these letters are read out, interviews of the students are conducted and devised to solve the grievances.

5. Obstacles faced if any and strategies adopted to overcome them

The practice had certain obstacles which had been removed in the course of functioning of the cell. The students were primarily unwilling to record their grievances against their teachers and the college administration. Later on, however, with the introduction of confidential and anonymous system of recording grievances, this obstacle has been removed to a large extent.

6. Impact of the practice

The practice has deep rooted impact on the functioning of college administration, the teaching mode and competency level of the faculty members. It has also inculcated among the students a sense of self confidence to ventilate their grievances. The college authority has benefited from the suggestions to improve infrastructural facilities. The formation of the weekly free medical check up centre was established in collaboration with the alumni

association of the college . This is one example of the impact of the formation of the cell. This centre started operating as a result of a letter submitted in the complaint box of the college by a hostel boarder requesting the establishment of such a centre within the college campus. Another instance is the setting up of an extension counter of a bank within the college campus. The college administration has already approached the Bank of Maharastra and Syndicate Bank to establish such a counter and the process will complete shortly. There were numerous complaints regarding lack of space in the reading room of the college library. As a result the college authority has decided to extend the library to a more specious area of about 4500 sq. ft. The construction is complete. The cell has also contributed to maintain and improve the academic ambience and develop a student-centered atmosphere of teaching-learning evaluation process in the college.

7. Resources required

The fundamental feature of this practice is that it requires minimum resources to form this cell. Setting up of complain boxes in the corridors is the only resource required for the functioning of this cell.

- 1. The proceedings of the Governing Body meeting held on 25.04.2006 were read out and confirmed.
- 2.The Governing Body approved the resolutions of the Finance Committee meeting held on 21.08.06 and accorded concurrence with the transfer of money amounting to Rs. Ten Lakhs from the General Fund Morning to the Capital Fund 25.8.2006 to meet the scheduled expenditures subject to adjustment.
- 3. The Governing Body approved the provisional holiday list for the session 2006-2007 subject to alteration, if necessary in accordance with the University Academic Calendar.
- 4. The Governing Body approved the Assessment Report submitted by the Class Workload Committee and resolved that part time teachers be appointed temporarily for different subjects as has been stated in the said report in compliance with the University guidelines.
- 5. The Governing Body approved the decision of the Building planning Committee (UGC) as has been taken in its meeting held on 6.7.2006 for construction of the first floor as the extension of the ground floor of the existing hostel building (Unit II) with the financial assistance from the UGC during the Xth plan period and passed the following resolutions:
- i) The proposal of the building project for constructions of women's hostel be submitted to the University Grants Commission, ERO, Kolkata so as to procure financial assistance.
- ii) The expenditure over and above the UGC Grant be borne by the College from its own resource.
- 6. At the instance of the Inspector of Colleges, B.U. the Governing Body resolves that the guidelines prescribed by the Under Graduate Council of the University be followed in the matter of appointment of part time teachers and constitution of the selection committee thereof and further the Governing Body nominates Prof. Sujit Kr. Panja and Prof. Dipendu Bandyopadhyay as member of the selection committee respectively for Arts/Commerce subjects and Science subjects.
- 7. (a) On the appraisal of completion of one year probation period satisfactorily in respect of Smt Manika Saha, lecturer in Geography the Governing Body resolves that Smt Manika Saha be confirmed in her services with effect from the date 21.06.2005 on which she has joined the college.
- (b) On the appraisal of completion of the one year probation period satisfactorily in respect of Sri Bibekananda Sahu, Lecturer in Commerce, the Governing Body resolves that Sri Bibekananda Sahu be confirmed in his services with effect from the date 01.07.2005 on which he has joined the college.

- 8. In consideration of the application from Smt Abha Mallick, Lecturer in Bengali for maternity leave the Governing Body resolves that Smt Abha Mallick be allowed the benefit of maternity leave for 135 days and granted her maternity leave w.e.f. 15.05.06 to 26.10.2006.
- 9. The Governing Body notes that Computer Science and Applications classes have been running in the hall annexed to Room No 6 at the ground floor of the main building, under the supervision and entrepreneurship of Mrs. Soma Bagchi, Course Coordinator after the discontinuance of the Computer Training Centre on the expiry of the five year Term (07.10.96 6.10.200) of the MOU executed between the Webel Informatics Ltd, 18 A Park Street, Kolkata -71 and the Asansol Girls' College. Nowthat the college urgently needs space for accommodation of class / Laboratory to run the newly introduced subjects this year, the Governing Body takes up the following decisions to resolve the problem of dearth of space.
 - i) The Computer Science Classes for B.Com students in the Morning Section be shifted to the Mancha building under the control of the BCA department.
 - ii) The Computer Science Classes for HS students be conducted at the existing premises till December 2006 in view of the fact that the HS Course has already been disaffiliated from the college w.e.f. the current session.
 - iii) Mrs Soma Bagchi be requested to vacate the hall annexed to Room No 6 by December 2006.
 - iv) The hall annexed to Room No. 6 be allotted in the class Routine as a substitute of R.No. 11 which in turn be used as a laboratory for the Physics department.

The Governing Body, however, express its profound appreciation of service rendered by Mrs. Soma Bagchi to help run the Computer Classes of the HS & Degree Course over the years.

10. Considered the Proposal for opening an Extension Service Counter of a Nationalised Bank in the College premises for transaction facility of the College funds through the Bank and benefit of the Staff and Students in general.

Discussion was held on the issue and it is resolved that

- i) The Syndicate Bank, Asansol Branch be approached for the establishment of an extended service Counter.
- ii) The existing office room No. 1 may be lease out for housing the extension Counter of the Bank on mutually agreed terms and conditions.
- 11. The Governing Body accepts and approve the proposal for introduction of an emblem ,of the college and unanimously selected the symbol of a flying bird that carries a book on its wings with the message in the words of Kabiguru Rabindranath Tagore: "Amar Mukti Aloy Aloy" in Bengali Scripts.

The Governing Body expects that the emblem will reflect the mission of the college, the age old ideology that education is for acquisition of knowledge and liberation of souls.

12. At the outset of the discussion on the agendum, the PTTACU,WB of the College Unit placed a memorandum before the Governing Body and demonstrated deputation on their demand for part time allowance @ 4000/- p.m. with arrears.

The Governing Body persuaded the agitating members of the association to wait for favourable action on behalf of the college to meet up their demand till we hear from the DPI, WB for sanction of any grant towards part time allowance.

- 13. For the purpose of management of the department of Nutrition and Hindi, the Governing body resolves that Prof. T.K.Pramanik be requested to take charge of the department of Nutrition as the officiating coordinator and further requests the principal to select one of the whole time teachers from the Arts faculty in consultation with the Secretary Teachers' Council for the coordinator ship in the Hindi Department.
- 14. Noted that the post filling up permission accorded by the DPI, WB in his memo no 1017-c dated 17.7.06 against the vacancies in the posts of (i) Clerk (ii) Library Clerk has been cancelled vide DPI Memo No. 1186-C dated 29 Aug.2006
- 15. (I) Noted that Jogmohan Goel And Associates, Kolkata has been appointed for audit of the College accounts vide DPI Memo No. 6(400)/1(180)CA/06 dated 30.5.06 The firm has examined the college accounts and submitted their report. The Governing body accepts and approves the Audit Report and resolves that the Audit Report be submitted to the Office of the DPI, WB.
- (II) Discussion was held on the memorandum No. 3473 dated 28.08.2006 from the Chief Medical Officer of Health, Burdwan in connection with the prolonged absence of Smt Mandalika Chakraborty, SGL in History and noted that she has been granted different kinds of leave on medical ground as (a) Earned leave 180 days for the period from 21.03.1997 to 16.09.1997 (b) Half pay leave 290 days for the period from 17.09.1997 to 03.07.1998 and (c) Extra ordinary leave without pay 1003 days for the period from 04.07.1998 to 01.04.2001 and 1491 days from 12.04.2001 to 11.05.2005 vide G.B. resolution no 8 dated 11.05.2005.

On the satisfactory report from the Medical Board under the Chairmanship of CMOH, Burdwan that she is fit for her service, the Governing Body resolves that she be allowed to resume the college with immediate effect and further passed the following resolutions.

i) The Director of Public Instruction, WB be apprised of the facts and circumstances leading to the prolonged absence of Smt Mandalika Chakraborty, SGL in History on her rejoining the college.

The Director of Public Instruction, W.B. be moved for approval of the different categories of leave granted to Smt Chakraborty by the Governing Body vide DPI memo no. 688 – C dated 24th March, 2005 for approval of all such leave and for approval of her resumption to her duties in the college w.e.f. the date she joins so as to proceed for refixation of her pay.

ii)The absence of Smt Mandalika Chakraborty for the period from 12.05.05 till the date prior to her resume in the college be condoned and Extra ordinary leave on medical ground without pay be granted to her for the period from 12.05.05 till the date preceding her rejoining the college in consideration of her medical examination and report thereof.

III.(a)Consequent upon the approval of Teacher Fellowship Award in favour of Smt Saswati Majumder, SGL in Bengali under the Faculty Improvement Programme (XPlan) vide UGC letter no F-TF-WI-008-01/06-07 (ERO) dated nil and subsequent application dated 28.08.2006 from Smt Majumder, the Governing Body has been pleased to sanction her leave for a period of two years w.e.f. 20.09.2006 with full pay in view of completion of her Ph.D degree at the Jadavpur University.

(b) In view of the fact that Smt. Saswati Majumdar SGL in Bengali has been awarded Teacher Fellow under The Faculty Improvement Programme of The University Grant Commission and she has been granted leave for the period of two years from 20.9.2006, The post of lecturer in Bengali has been fallen vacant temporarily w.e.f. 20.9.06 and will remain vacant till 19.9.2008. The Governing Body resolves that necessary papers be submitted for filling up the FIP –vacancy to the office of the concerned authorities:

- IV) Business arising out of the deputation represented by the PTTACU, W.B.:

Resolved that the benefit of festival advance @ Rs. 4000/- per head be allowed to the part time teachers provided that they are in continuous service for at least 10 months as on September, 2006.

(V) In Consideration of the applications from Hostels Staff (i) Sri Sristi Das (ii) Sri Mahadeb Dutta (iii) Sahadeb Dutta for withdrawal of their savings deposit at the Treasury, the Governing Body accords permission for withdrawal & reimbursement of the outstanding balance credited to their savings account lying at the Asansol Treasury.

VI) Discussion was held on the occurrence of casual vacancy in the TR-Category of the Governing Body (2003-2006) due to retirement of Smt (Dr) Madhuri Karmakar, Reader in Zoology on 31.08.2006. The members of the Governing Body unanimously preferred not to hold election to fill up the said vacancy in consideration of the fact that the tenure of the existing GB is going to expire shortly.

The members of the Governing Body expressed profound appreciation of the valuable services rendered by Smt (Dr) Madhuri Karmakar as Teachers' Representative of the Governing Body.
